#### Warm up- Angle hunters Can you find these angles in your house or garden. Acute- smaller than 90' Right angle- 90' Straight line – 180' Obtuse- larger than 180' Try to find 3 examples of each.

L.O: Angles on a straight line.

The angles on a straight line equal 180 degrees. Using this knowledge we can work out the size of angles that might be missing. If I had a straight line showing an angle of 30' on it, I would need to subtract 30 from 180. This tells me the missing angle will be 150
