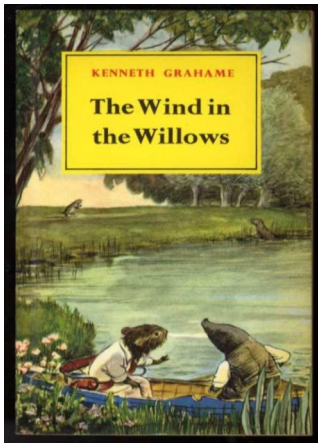




Reading Newsletter.

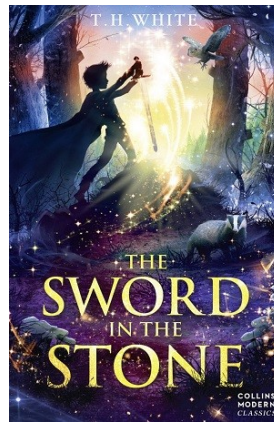

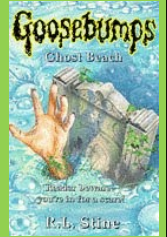

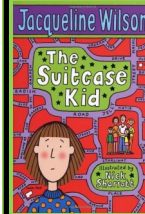


Who is your favourite book character and why?

Which children's book would you like to read that you have never got around to reading?

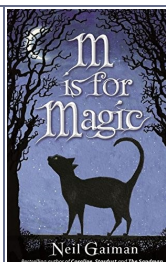
I have never finished any Tolkien book I have started. I feel that I must finish one some point soon though.



Max Magic is by TV magician Stephen Mulhern. He knows a trick or two!



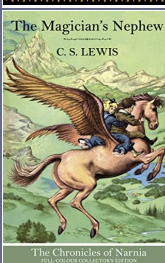
The Magic Misfits by Neil Patrick Harris. Funny story to make you believe in magic!



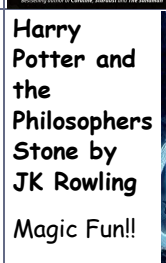
M is for Magic by Neil Gaiman is a fabulous collection of magical stories.



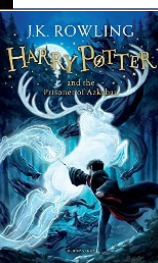
A Pinch of Magic by Michelle Harrison. 3 sisters and their magical adventures!



The Magician's Nephew by CS Lewis. Feel sorry for the poor guinea pigs!!

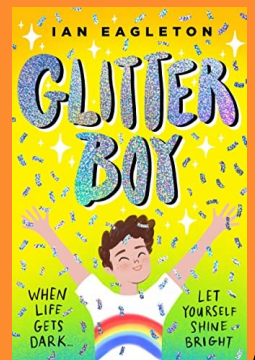


Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone by JK Rowling. Magic Fun!!

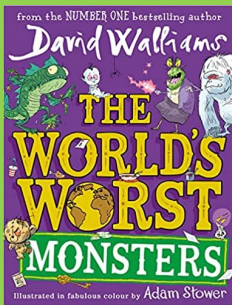


This is a book about courage and being proud of who you are. About standing up to bullies and being true to yourself. A heart-warming and character led story full of humour and joy.

If you enjoyed the King's Coronation and would like to learn a little more about our new king this book is highly recommended!

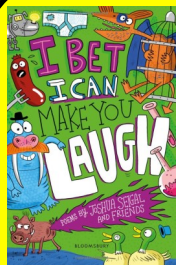
King Charles-The Little People Big Dreams series of books are always a good read and beautifully illustrated too.

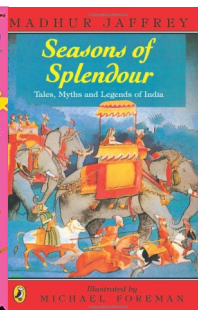
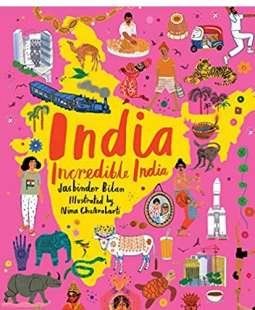
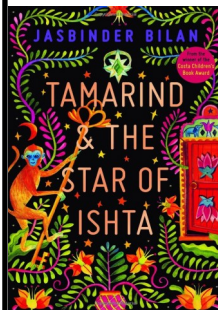
