It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need. The Education Inspection Framework (Ofsted 2019 p64) makes clear there will be a focus on 'whether leaders and those responsible for governors all understand their respective roles and perform these in a way that enhances the effectiveness of the school'.

Under the Quality of Education criteria (p41) inspectors consider the extent to which schools can articulate their curriculum (INTENT), construct their curriculum (IMPLEMENTATION) and demonstrate the outcomes which result (IMPACT).

To assist schools with common transferable language this template has been developed to utilise the same three headings which should make your plans easily transferable between working documents.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of Physical Education, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's budget • should fund these.

This document will help you to review your provision and to report your spend. DfE encourages schools to use this template as an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

We recommend you start by reflecting on the impact of current provision and reviewing the previous spend.

Schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding, including any under-spend from 2019/2020, as well as on the impact it has on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment by the end of the summer term or by 31st July 2021 at the latest.

ey achievements to date until July 2023:	Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:
 We achieved the Sports Mark Platinum Award – the highest achievement, which is a continuation of the previous year's award. NJS have embedded PE assessments across school – enabling all children to successfully talk about PE and Sport and the skills and knowledge they have learnt. Throughout the academic year we kept the children active. We entered more TWSSP events and other local cluster events which enabled more children to participate in competitive sport. Using our own swimming pool we have been able to continuously maintain our swimming and the end of year 6 swimming data supports this. We managed our Outdoor Education opportunities well of 1 residential per year group; Yr 3 – Edgmond Hall, a sustainable, 1 night, residential where the children walked to their nights stay; Yr 4 – Manor Adventure 2 nights further away from home; Yr 5 – Arthog – A weeks residential supported by the LEA; Yr 6 – London – 3 nights visiting the sights of London. Due to the COVID pandemic the Yr 5 residential was postponed, and their week given to the leaving Yr 6 – we have arranged an extra week, in November, for this to happen. Club provision provided and open to all at school with increased participation from vulnerable groups; this increasing competitive sport: increase numbers participating, and the numbers of varied sports entered. Quality PE provision was provided to all children from quality first teaching and selected CPD support coaching. Club provision has been maintained with a variety of sporting clubs offered to different ages of children. All children were able to take part in year group sports days and year group Swimming Galas. 	 activities to all pupils. Do the residential opportunities still support the costs financially?
